Welcome to St. Luke's Cathedral!

We are a faith community with ancient worship and modern thought, catholic traditions and progressive theology. We proclaim a Biblical perspective for thinking people, a respect for reason, science, and a diversity of perspective. This empowers compassion and care for both the wider community and one another. Our commitment to welcome and inclusion is central to our mission modeled on the Kingdom of God and proclaimed by Jesus Christ. We are part of the 1.7 million-member Episcopal Church in the United States, and the 85-million-member worldwide Anglican Communion.



New to St. L'uke's? We are delighted to welcome you to the cathedral and are grateful for your presence with us today. We invite you to fill out our visitor's register at either entrance of the cathedral nave.

Our Mission: St. Luke's welcomes every person to share in the Episcopal Church's mission "to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Jesus Christ." As a cathedral, St. Luke's is the seat of the bishop and the chief mission church of the Diocese and people of Maine. St. Luke's first service was held on Christmas Day in 1868, and continues over 150 years of reaching out to the city and people of Portland.

How we worship: Throughout the bulletin, the congregation is invited to say aloud all text marked "people", and to sing all music printed in the order of service. There are also times when it is customary to make the sign of the cross by touching your forehead, chest, left shoulder, and right shoulder. If you wish to do so, the # indicates that. Instructions for how to receive communion are provided later in the bulletin, at that point in the liturgy.

Where are the restrooms? There are four restrooms in the parish house, through the doors at the front left corner of the church. Men's and women's restrooms are across the large room at the top of the ramp: walk straight across, through the double doors and to your left. On the lower level, there are two accessible, single-stall (non-gender) restrooms, one on either end of the large room. If you need help finding them, please ask an usher.

Visit our child-friendly gathering space beside the baptismal font on the east wall of the nave, a place where children and their guardians can move around and engage with soft toys, books, yet still participate in worship.

Worship Resources: Except where otherwise indicated, all spoken texts used in worship are from *The Book of Common Prayer* (1979). And, except where otherwise indicated, all music not in the public domain is reprinted and streamed with permission under OneLicense.net #A-713087 and/or RiteSong.

Sunday parking for St. Luke's: Off-street parking is available in two locations for those attending Sunday services: our lot adjacent to the Parish Hall, accessed from Park St.; and the Cumberland Club's (Spring Street between Park & High Sts.). We are grateful to the Cumberland Club for sharing their space with us (except on Easter and Mother's Day). In addition, limited handicap parking is available in the traffic circle in the State Street churchyard.

St. Luke's Territorial Acknowledgement

St Luke's acknowledges that we are worshiping on "unceded territory taken by force and previously occupied by the Wabanaki people." (Amended City Charter, Portland, Maine). Some of the resources that built this cathedral came from industry related to the slave trade in the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries. We join our fellow residents in honoring the Wabanaki knowledge and culture that continues to thrive in the Tribal Nations. We ask for Blessing and Peace upon all indigenous peoples that have called, and always will call, this place—"The Dawnland"—HOME.

Communion of the People

All are welcome to receive Holy Communion. As the Dona Community says, "Come to this table, you who have much faith and you who would like to have more; you who have been here often and you who have not been here in a long time; you who have tried to follow Jesus and you who have failed. Come. It is Christ who invites us to meet him here."

Ushers will assist you to approach by the center and return by the side aisles. You are welcome to receive the bread and/or the wine when presented; we believe that the divine presence is fully present in both the bread and the wine, and you may refuse either. For example, you may choose to receive only the bread, and then walk away; or, if you would like, you may touch the chalice with your hand, and not actually consume any wine. If you would like to receive the blessing of the Church, but not communion, indicate to the clergy by crossing your arms when approached. If you are not able to come forward, please motion to an usher, and communion will be brought to you. Per Diocesan guidelines, we do not practice intinction (dipping the bread into the wine) at this time.

Prayers of Healing are offered in All Saints Chapel (to the right of the kneeling rail). Members of the prayer team will assist you in offering prayer of healing for yourself or a loved one.





HAPPENING TODAY

H Requiem "for the pleasure of it"

So proclaimed Gabriel Fauré in giving cause for writing a Requiem mass.

Odd, since the Requiem mass had come to be known as the genre of magnum opus, the place in which a composer makes his most profound expression of self. Mozart, Cherubini, Verdi, Bruckner, Brahms—their masses for the dead are defining works. But then, perhaps the notion of a Requiem mass being one's ultimate musical statement is purely a Romantic affectation. Some people have written more than one; Brazilian composer José Maurício Garcia, for example, composed four, the last of them in 1816. This was, however, before that selfsame Romantic notion could have arisen, and commissions of musical settings for actual liturgical use were more common in the 18th century and earlier.

Gabriel Fauré's Requiem, Op. 46, was composed over several years in the 1880s after the death of his parents, but he claims to have had no particular motivation. Unlike many choral settings of the Latin Mass for the Dead, it omits the wrathful hymn Dies Drae, whose depiction of eternal perdition in Verdi's Requiem is truly frightening. Fauré may have been reacting to such as this, and was also inspired by Johannes Brahms's Ein Deutsches Requiem (1860s), which is not a liturgical work at all, but uses German texts, assembled by the composer himself from the Luther Bible, to construct a humanistic, if also sacred, work that suppresses fear and wrath, and focuses on the fleeting nature of life and of comfort for the dead and the bereaved. Fauré tacks in this same direction, while still using most of the Roman Catholic text. It is, overall, a soothing work, and lovely. Fauré's melodic and harmonic gifts are on display, and the shop window must have had no glass: John Rutter and Andrew Lloyd Webber both stole inspiration from it, for derivative Requiems of their own that pale in comparison to its grace and beauty.

For modern liturgists, incorporating a Requiem mass into a Sunday service presents several challenges. First, the principal eucharistic liturgy of the week is not supposed to be a Mass for the Dead. Second, employing a Requiem mass forces the omission and/or alteration of some essential texts, e.g., the "Agnus Dei" (Lamb of God), sung at the Fraction (Breaking of the Bread) during the Eucharistic prayer ends with different words ("Grant them eternal rest.") than the standard Eucharistic text ("Grant us peace."). Other changes must occur, too, in order to accommodate a lot of text that, in the structure of the Mass for the Dead, occurs after communion. We have reordered the movements of the mass (as you can see from their Roman numeral headings) to keep a liturgical flow in the Liturgy of the Word, and not get bogged down at the end of the service. Of course, this compromises the dramatic flow of the music, but with so many spoken liturgical elements, we will not find it jarring to do so.

On final complication to present: we are creating a mash-up of the celebratory Feast of All Saints' (r November, often moved to the Sunday closest) with the somber and reflective Commemoration of All [the] Faithful Departed (2 November, optional in the Anglican Communion, and further not observed on a Sunday). Because we still want to celebrate, and sing favorite hymns, we are essentially building an All Saints' frame around an All Souls' mass, peppering the liturgy with joyous hymns. This way, we may enter the sonic and spiritual world of the Fauré Requiem as purely as we can in our time and place, before ushering you back to All Saints' Sunday with our closing hymn.

One final note: tomorrow is the centenary of Gabriel Fauré's death. In addition to being one of the best-known and most beloved of French composers, Fauré was infuential and highly-regarded in his own time, as both a composer and a performer. We encourage you to read more about him, and explore more of his music, and that of his time.
