Welcome to St. Luke's Cathedral!

We are a faith community with ancient worship and modern thought, catholic traditions and progressive theology. We proclaim a Biblical perspective for thinking people, a respect for reason, science, and a diversity of perspective. This empowers compassion and care for both the wider community and one another. Our commitment to welcome and inclusion is central to our mission modeled on the Kingdom of God and proclaimed by Jesus Christ. We are part of the 1.7 million-member **Episcopal Church** in the United States, and the 85-million-member worldwide **Anglican Communion**.



New to St. Luke's? We are delighted to welcome you to the cathedral and are grateful for your presence with us today. We invite you to fill out our visitor's register at either entrance of the cathedral nave.

Our Mission: St. Luke's welcomes every person to share in the Episcopal Church's mission "to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Jesus Christ." As a cathedral, St. Luke's is the seat of the bishop and the chief mission church of the Diocese and people of Maine. St. Luke's first service was held on Christmas Day in 1868, and continues over 150 years of reaching out to the city and people of Portland.

How we worship: Throughout the bulletin, the congregation is invited to say all **bolded** text aloud, and to sing all music printed in the order of service. There are also times when it is customary to make the sign of the cross by touching your forehead, chest, left shoulder, and right shoulder. If you wish to do so, the $\mbox{\ensuremath{\mbox{$\mu$}}}$ indicates that. Instructions for how to receive communion are provided later in the bulletin, at that point in the liturgy.

Where are the restrooms? There are four restrooms in the parish house, through the doors at the front left corner of the church. Men's and women's restrooms are across the large room at the top of the ramp: walk straight across, through the double doors and to your left. On the lower level, there are two accessible, single-stall (non-gender) restrooms, one on either end of the large room. If you need help finding them, please ask an usher.

Visit our child-friendly gathering space: beside the baptismal font on the east wall of the nave, a place where children and their guardians can move around and engage with soft toys, books, yet still participate in worship.

Worship Resources: Except where otherwise indicated, all spoken texts used in worship are from *The Book of Common Prayer* (1979). And, except where otherwise indicated, all music not in the public domain is reprinted and streamed with permission under OneLicense.net #A-713087 and/or RiteSong.

Sunday parking for St. Luke's: Off-street parking is available in two locations for those attending Sunday services: our lot adjacent to the Parish Hall, accessed from Park St.; and the Cumberland Club's (Spring Street between Park & High Sts.). We are grateful to the Cumberland Club for sharing their space with us (except on Easter and Mother's Day). In addition, limited handicap parking is available in the traffic circle in the State Street churchyard.

St. Luke's Territorial Acknowledgement

St Luke's acknowledges that we are worshiping on "unceded territory taken by force and previously occupied by the **Wabanaki people**." (Amended City Charter, Portland, Maine). Some of the resources that built this cathedral came from industry related to the slave trade in the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries. We join our fellow residents in honoring the Wabanaki knowledge and culture that continues to thrive in the Tribal Nations. We ask for Blessing and Peace upon all indigenous peoples that have called, and always will call, this place—"The Dawnland"—HOME.



Communion of the People

All are welcome to receive Holy Communion. As the Iona Community says, "Come to this table, you who have much faith and you who would like to have more; you who have been here often and you who have not been here in a long time; you who have tried to follow Jesus and you who have failed. Come. It is Christ who invites us to meet him here."

Ushers will assist you to approach by the center and return by the side aisles. You are welcome to receive the bread and/or the wine when presented; we believe that the divine presence is fully present in both the bread and the wine, and you may refuse either. For example, you may choose to receive only the bread, and then walk away; or, if you would like, you may touch the chalice with your hand, and not actually consume any wine. If you would like to receive the blessing of the Church, but not communion, indicate to the clergy by crossing your arms when approached. If you are not able to come forward, please motion to an usher, and communion will be brought to you. Per Diocesan guidelines, the cathedral does not practice intinction (dipping the bread into the wine) at this time.

Prayers of Healing are offered in All Saints Chapel (to the right of the kneeling rail). Members of the prayer team will assist you in offering prayer of healing for yourself or a loved one.



Postlude

v. Acclamations (sur le texte des acclamations carolingiennes) from Suite Médiévale

Music: Jean Langlais (1907-1991)

About the postlude... Jean Langlais's Suite Médiévale is described as being "in the form of a low mass," that is, to provide music for a celebration of the eucharist that includes no singing. Each movement quotes at least one plainsong melody from the Roman Rite. The final movement, Acclamations (sur le texte des acclamations carolingiennes), is a toccata, more sturdy than brilliant, based on the Carolingian acclamation "Christus vincit" ("Christ triumphs"), a five note motive heard in the pedal after each of the opening flourishes. The whole majestic movement is based on this motive, for a fitting close, both musically and theologically. Suite Médiévale is idiomatic of the "organ Mass," one of the standard forms of the Mass celebrated in Roman Catholic churches throughout western Europe, but especially in France. The organ Mass is a form of the High (i.e., sung) Mass of Sundays and solemn celebrations. The possible uses of the organ in the Mass were standardized by 1600. In general, the organ plays in alternation with sung versets of plainsong during the Ordinary of the Mass, that is the Kyrie Eleison, Gloria in excelsis, Sanctus, Benedictus, Agnus Dei, at the offertory, the elevation of the host, and at the Dismissal. Traditionally, these organ versets have been improvisatory in style, if not truly improvised, and quote, or are inspired by, the plainsong versets that they replace. The organ Mass became the foundation of a French improvisatory idiom in the 19th and 20th centuries, of which Suite Médiévale is a product. Composer & organist Jean Langlais (1907-1991) studied composition with a student of César Franck and was appointed organist to the Church of St. Clotilde in Paris in 1945. This blind virtuoso player and improvisor also taught at the Paris Schola Cantorum. In addition to his organ works, he also composed for orchestra and chamber ensembles.
