Welcome to St. Luke's Cathedral!

We are a faith community with ancient worship and modern thought, catholic traditions and progressive theology. We proclaim a Biblical perspective for thinking people, a respect for reason, science, and a diversity of perspective. This empowers compassion and care for both the wider community and one another. Our commitment to welcome and inclusion is central to our mission modeled on the Kingdom of God and proclaimed by Jesus Christ. We are part of the 1.7 million-member **Episcopal Church** in the United States, and the 85-million-member worldwide **Anglican Communion**.



New to St. Luke's? We are delighted to welcome you to the cathedral and are grateful for your presence with us today. We invite you to fill out our visitor's register at either entrance of the cathedral nave.

Our Mission: St. Luke's welcomes every person to share in the Episcopal Church's mission "to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Jesus Christ." As a cathedral, St. Luke's is the seat of the bishop and the chief mission church of the Diocese and people of Maine. St. Luke's first service was held on Christmas Day in 1868, and continues over 150 years of reaching out to the city and people of Portland.

How we worship: Throughout the bulletin, the congregation is invited to say all **bolded** text aloud, and to sing all music printed in the order of service. There are also times when it is customary to make the sign of the cross by touching your forehead, chest, left shoulder, and right shoulder. If you wish to do so, the B indicates that. Instructions for how to receive communion are provided later in the bulletin, at that point in the liturgy.

Where are the restrooms? There are four restrooms in the parish house, through the doors at the front left corner of the church. Men's and women's restrooms are across the large room at the top of the ramp: walk straight across, through the double doors and to your left. On the lower level, there are two accessible, single-stall (non-gender) restrooms, one on either end of the large room. If you need help finding them, please ask an usher.

Visit our child-friendly gathering space: beside the baptismal font on the east wall of the nave, a place where children and their guardians can move around and engage with soft toys, books, yet still participate in worship.

Worship Resources: Except where otherwise indicated, all spoken texts used in worship are from *The Book of Common Prayer* (1979). And, except where otherwise indicated, all music not in the public domain is reprinted and streamed with permission under OneLicense.net #A-713087 and/or RiteSong.

Sunday parking for St. Luke's: Off-street parking is available in two locations for those attending Sunday services: our lot adjacent to the Parish Hall, accessed from Park St.; and the Cumberland Club's (Spring Street between Park & High Sts.). We are grateful to the Cumberland Club for sharing their space with us (except on Easter and Mother's Day). In addition, limited handicap parking is available in the traffic circle in the State Street churchyard.

St. Luke's Territorial Acknowledgement

St Luke's acknowledges that we are worshiping on "unceded territory taken by force and previously occupied by the **Wabanaki people**." (Amended City Charter, Portland, Maine). Some of the resources that built this cathedral came from industry related to the slave trade in the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries. We join our fellow residents in honoring the Wabanaki knowledge and culture that continues to thrive in the Tribal Nations. We ask for Blessing and Peace upon all indigenous peoples that have called, and always will call, this place—"The Dawnland"—HOME.




Philippians 1:3-11


The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

Communion of the People

All are welcome to receive Holy Communion. As the Iona Community says, "Come to this table, you who have much faith and you who would like to have more; you who have been here often and you who have not been here in a long time; you who have tried to follow Jesus and you who have failed. Come. It is Christ who invites us to meet him here."

Ushers will assist you to approach by the center and return by the side aisles. You are welcome to receive the bread and/or the wine when presented; we believe that the divine presence is fully present in both the bread and the wine, and you may refuse either. For example, you may choose to receive only the bread, and then walk away; or, if you would like, you may touch the chalice with your hand, and not actually consume any wine. If you would like to receive the blessing of the Church, but not communion, indicate to the clergy by crossing your arms when approached. If you are not able to come forward, please motion to an usher, and communion will be brought to you. Per Diocesan guidelines, the cathedral does not practice intinction (dipping the bread into the wine) at this time.

Prayers of Healing are offered in All Saints Chapel (to the right of the kneeling rail). Members of the prayer team will assist you in offering prayer of healing for yourself or a loved one.



Collecting Signatures for the "Safe Schools, Safe Communities" Initiative: This morning parishioner Gus Goodwin will be collecting signatures for the "Safe Schools, Safe Communities" community initiative, after church during coffee hour. The "Safe Schools Safe Communities" citizen initiative to pass an Extreme Risk Protection Order law in Maine will help keep our kids, families, schools and communities safe by empowering family members to get help when a loved one is in crisis. Extreme Risk Protection Orders provide a much-needed tool for families and law enforcement to intervene before a crisis becomes a tragedy. Firearms are now the leading cause of death for American children and teens. Other states have used these laws to disarm people who threatened school shootings. Additionally, these types of laws are effective in reducing incidents of suicide—the leading cause of firearm death in Maine, especially among men. The goal is to do everything that we can to prevent gun violence and by signing the petition, you will show support to encourage the Maine legislature to pass an ERPO Law. If they fail to take action then this petition will let us put this common sense proposal to prevent gun violence out to the voters. The Safe Schools, Safe Communities campaign is a coalition effort by gun responsibility advocates, health care and mental health professionals, teachers, gun owners, veterans groups and faith leaders, including The Maine Council of Churches and the Episcopal Diocese of Maine.

Note from the Interim Dean about our search for Clergy Leadership: On Wednesday 20 November, the Lesser Chapter gathered with our search consultant, the Rev. Pamela Mott, to consider the nominations for the four committees that will search for our next Dean. We had robust interest and wonderful nominees. After the meeting, we learned that some nominations made late in the process were inadvertently omitted from consideration. Additionally, following our meeting, members of our Vestry raised questions about the process of populating the committees that necessitated further conversation and consideration. All this is to say that the work of the Vestry around establishing the search committees is ongoing. A substantial part of the December Lesser Chapter meeting (December 18) will be to talk about our search for new clergy leadership with the Rt. Rev. Thomas Brown, our Bishop. Jonathan Radtke to be ordained to the Transitional Deaconate: We are delighted to announce that the Commission on Ministry and Standing Committee of the Diocese of Maine has approved Jon Radtke for ordination to the Transitional Diaconate, with ordination to the priesthood likely in June. - Reduce Maine's greenhouse gas emissions: While Maine has made meaningful progress in reducing emissions, we must reduce them at a faster pace to meet the state's 2030 and 2050 targets, and do our part to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius this century.
- Strengthen resilience to climate impacts: Maine must take action to ensure that our people, environment, economy, and society are more resilient to the impacts of climate change that are now occurring. While mitigating the causes of climate change and better preparing Maine for its impacts requires significant public and private investment, inaction will cost Maine substantially more, and those costs will accelerate over time.
- Create jobs and economic prosperity: Many of the strategies in this climate action plan will grow the economy, protect key economic sectors most at risk from climate change, and foster innovation in new business sectors that will drive climate solutions.
- Bring climate action to all Maine people: Some Maine people and communities experience climate-change




