 - i. Legislature is not in session so there were no updates.

Thursday, September 11th (7–9 AM) for the kick-off event of <u>Eggs & Issues Semester 1 "Portland: A 21st Century City."</u> This first course will offer a timely discussion on both the immediate challenges and long-term opportunities facing our downtown. Hear from Mayor Mark Dion and Cary Tyson of Portland Downtown as they address short-term issues and solutions; Kevin Bunker of Developers Collaborative, who shares insights on adaptive reuse and increasing housing density; and Elizabeth

c Federal

i. Endangerment Finding

- 1. On July 29 the EPA proposed to rescind its 2009 endangerment finding that forms the basis of all federal climate pollution regulations.
- 2. Without the endangerment finding, the EPA may not be allowed or able to regulate greenhouse gas pollution from sources like power plants or vehicle tailpipes, as they have done for years. It is my understanding that citizens can now make <u>official comments</u> on the Department of Energy's <u>proposal</u> to challenge and repeal the 2009 EPA Greenhouse Gas Endangerment Finding.
- 3. The process is open to the public as part of the formal rulemaking procedure, and any citizen can submit written comments that become part of the public record. Citizens can also register to attend public hearings.
- 4. The EPA's proposed rollback of the endangerment finding is open to public comments until September 15, and the agency will hold virtual public hearings on August 19 and 20. After responding to the public comments, the EPA will finalize the rule. We urge you to click on the above link and submit your comment. We need to show the EPA that there is overwhelming support for preservation of the endangerment finding.
